### about this report

In **2016 Stay Safe East** and Merton Centre for Independent Living did a project to **find out** about **disability hate crime** in **Merton**. They looked at **information** about hate crime and also **talked** to **disabled** people.

This **report** is about what they found out.

what is disability hate crime?

Any **crime** that happens because someone **hates** another **type** of **person** is a hate crime.



- Hate crimes can happen to
- disabled people
- Black or Asian people or people of
   other races



people of a different religion



people who are gay or bisexual



• people who are **transgender** 





• teasing someone



 telling other people someone is disabled



 complaining about someone for no reason



- using bad words
- damaging property or
   stopping someone moving about

Disability hate crime can get worse and worse and end in killing someone.



## disability hate crime in this country



**Disabled** people are **more likely** to be **hurt** or **abused** than other people. **Violence** against **disabled** people is **going up**.



Race hate crime is the most common kind of hate crime. Disability hate crime is second most common.

This table is about the people who suffer the most hate crime each year.





**Disability hate crime** usually happens to **people** who are **outside society** for **another reason** as well. For example a **disabled** person is more likely to be a victim of **hate crime** if they are also

• poor



lonely or isolated



living in a **council house** or **flat** 



a **woman** 



- gay
- Black or Asian or other races

I grew up hearing the **n word** all the time and being spat on. It is a bit like terms about disabled people



Most people who do disability hate crime are young white men. This is like people who do other crimes. But there are some differences.

For example

- more family members and carers do disability hate crime than other crimes
- more women do hate crimes than other crimes



 disability hate crime is sometimes done by groups of people together

They said this is the problem with this country but don't worry we will soon get rid of you with this government.







The **law** about **disability hate crime** is **not** as **strong** as for other hate crimes.



**Not many** people **report** disability hate crime.

This is because

- people do not understand what disability hate crime is
- they do not take it seriously enough



the police, social services and
 other organisations do not work
 well to stop it



 some disabled people think there is no point reporting it

Some of the police were respectful. Others said Why are you are wasting our time? You are a disgrace. Why can't you pull yourself together? Just snap out of it. A lot of people with mental health issues hear that but you are clinically depressed.

The story on the next page is about someone being killed. **Be careful.** It might upset you.

If nothing happens after hate crime is **reported** people can **die**.





The **Equality Act** is a **law** that says how different groups of people should be treated.

Since it started **lots** more **disability** hate crimes have been reported.

Disability Hate Crime Matters is a new way for police to deal with hate crime in London. It started in 2015.

In **London** things are getting **better**.





**Bijan** lived in **Bristol**. He was a **disabled** person from **Iran**.



His **neighbours bullied** him. This was **hate crime**. He told the **police** but they said he was **wasting** their **time**.









He took **pictures** of the **young people** who bullied him. They said that was **sexual abuse** and **Bijan** got **arrested**.

When **Bijan** went **home** again his neighbours **beat** him up. They **dragged** him out of his house and **killed** him by **setting fire** to him.

The **day** before Bijan died he **called** the **police 12** times.

After he died the **killer** went to **prison** for **life**. **3 police officers** went to **prison** too.



## disability hate crime in Merton



In the **last year** the number of people **reporting hate crime** in **Merton** has **not gone up** much. This is **different** from other parts of **London**.



total hate crimes reported hate crimes

It's an everyday experience. Right now it's happening to someone.

Last year there were about 500 disability hate crimes in Merton.

Only 12 got reported.



**Organisations** in **Merton** do **not talk** about **disability hate crime** enough. They talk about **anti social behaviour**. This is **not** the **same** thing.



There is **no plan** in **Merton** for dealing with **disability hate crime**.



Some things about **Merton** make it **hard** to **report disability hate crime** 



 Wimbledon police station is the only one that is open 24 hours a day.
 People are put off by how far they have to go to report a crime.



• there are **no third party reporting** centres in **Merton** 



 Merton Council, police and health services do not give out good information about disability hate crime



there is **no local information** about hate crime in **easy read** or **sign language** 



Merton Council, police and health
 services have not done much work
 with disabled people in the last few
 years



**Disabled people** in **Merton** need more **help** to **understand** what **hate crime** is.

They need **help** to **report** it.



**some** disabled people **understand** what **hate crime** is and **some** do **not** 



some disabled people do not report
things they think are less serious
like being called bad names

People try to bully me being disabled. They call me names and take the mickey. The stuff based in hate is the name calling, the spastics, the weirdos. I've never reported.



 half the people we talked to said they had been bullied or hurt in the last year. Some of them had been bullied more than 3 times.



**disabled** people in **Merton** want to **know more** about **hate crime** and what to **do** about it



disabled people in Merton want
things out in the open about hate
crime. They want to talk about their
experiences.



 some people in Merton do not trust the police. They talked about bad experiences with the police.



 people said the **police** need **training** from **disabled trainers**



some disabled people in Merton
 have had other types of hate crime
 too like hate crime because they are
 transgender or because they are
 Black or Asian or people of other
 races



 some women said they get abuse or people threaten to rape them
 because they are disabled



 some men and women said they get domestic abuse



 there is no help in Merton about domestic abuse that is just for disabled people



- most disabled people in Merton said they would report hate crime
  - if they could get help from a disabled organisation
  - if hate crime was taken
     seriously



**Disabled** people want the **hate** to **stop**. They want **help** that **keeps going**.

They want to



• be **safe** 



• **talk** to someone who **listens** and **believes** them



• **understand** what **choices** they have



• **understand** what will **happen** next



• feel in control



• get good support



 know something has been done about the hate crime



• get on with their life and not feel scared







- give people time and help to speak up
- Septembe May cemt August June



help people get over their terrible experience

work with people for a longer time







It can **help** people to **feel good** about themselves.



Having an **advocate** will **help**.

**Everyone** needs to **work together** in **Merton** to deal with **disability hate crime**.

1. write a **report** about hate crime called **No Place for Hate in Merton** 



2. have a **campaign** to **tell** people about **hate crime** 



3. let everyone know **where** they can **report** hate crime in **Merton** 



have meetings with the police,
 Council and disabled
 organisations to help people feel
 confident reporting hate crime



#### jobs for Merton Council



 make new information about hate crime and put it on the police and Council websites. Make sure it is in easy read and tells people how to report hate crime.



 work with other organisations to make a plan for keeping everyone in the community safe



 have meetings with other organisations and the police to deal with serious local cases



make sure everyone has the information they need about serious local cases







- check reports about abuse and make sure no hate crimes get missed
- 5. train Council staff about hate crime
- make sure **disabled** people get enough **help** when they have had **domestic abuse**

#### jobs for the police

- start a group with disabled people and organisations to talk about how the police deal with hate crime
- 2. have a **police officer** in **charge** of working on **hate crime** cases





- 3. get **more police officers** working with **disabled** people
- work with Merton Centre for Independent Living to train police staff about hate crime.



 ask disabled people to join the police advisory group. This is a group who give the police feedback about how to work.



 check through crime reports to see how well the police are doing and what they can do better



7. work with different organisations like groups for gay people and groups for Black and Asian people to talk about hate crime



 Train police officers to work with schools and young people about hate crime

#### jobs for housing associations

- have good information on their websites about hate crime
- put an article in their newsletters about hate crime and how to get help
- check through all the reports about anti social behaviour to make sure no hate crimes get missed
- 4. **tell** the **police meeting** about any **serious cases**
- 5. **train staff** about **hate crime** so they can **spot** it and **help**













jobs for Merton Centre for Independent Living



 make an easy website where disabled people can report hate crime



 provide advocates for disabled people who have had hate crime done to them



have meetings for people to talk
 about their experience of hate crime



 make a leaflet and poster about hate crime and how Merton Centre for Independent Living can help

#### advisory group

bisexual

a **group** of people who give **advice** about how to **work**. For example a **police advisory group** is a group of people who **help** the **police** work **better**.

anti social behaviourbehaviour that causes trouble or<br/>upsets people in the community.<br/>It is not as serious as hate crime.<br/>It is important that people do not<br/>mix up hate crime and anti social<br/>behaviour.

someone who **likes** both **men** and **women** 

Equality Act 2010a law that says everyone should be<br/>treated the same. It protects<br/>some groups of people who often<br/>get treated badly, like disabled<br/>people and people of different<br/>races.

n word	a <b>very bad word</b> about people who are <b>Black</b> . It causes a lot of <b>hurt</b> when it is <b>used</b> by <b>people</b> who are <b>not Black</b> .
third party reporting	<b>telling</b> an <b>organisation</b> you <b>trust</b> about <b>hate crime</b> . They will <b>report</b> the <b>hate crime</b> for you.
transgender	someone who is a <b>different sex</b> to what people <b>thought</b> when they were <b>born</b> . <b>Sometimes</b> <b>transgender</b> people have <b>operations</b> to <b>change</b> what they <b>look</b> like. <b>Sometimes</b> they do <b>not</b> .
